Public Schools, and

members of their respective Boards, the debate over deannexation has been resolved.

With years of experience and a mutual respect between the two superintendents, sessions began in an effort to determine a course of action regarding deannexation. Through those sessions, the two superintendents carefully and precicely devised a plan that would benefit both the Kiamichi Career Tech District and students attending Eufaula Public Schools.

The agreement states that Eufaula Schools will remain a member of the Kiamichi Career Tech District and that vocational classes will be offered on the Eufaula High School campus. In return, Kiamichi Career Tech will compensate Eufaula Public Schools for rental of classroom space, computer equipment, and related costs.

Corrective Action to ensure a balance between the number of students attending Career Tech classes and the burden on tax payers to provide those classes was long overdue. The sense of a healthy balance has now been resolved along with the question of deannexation from Kiamichi Career Tech District.

The outcome of the agreement between Eufaula Schools and Kiamichi Career Tech has set into motion a number of opportunities that include:

- Full rights for Eufaula students to attend all classes offered at the McAlester Career Tech Center;
- Full rights for Eufaula students to attend Career Tech classes offered at the Eufaula High School campus;
- Kiamichi Career Tech will provide funding to Eufaula Schools for On-Site costs that will offset the cost of constructing a new middle school.


Each year, the Oklahoma Foundation For Excellence honors 100 of Oklahoma's top graduating seniors. This year, Eufaula senior, Kelly Brunkhorst, was included in the Foundation's Top 100 Seniors and selected for Academic All-State.

Three Eufaula High School Seniors were recognized as Academic Scholars. Elizabeth Hurley, Renee Engle, and Kelly Brunkhorst received this honor for their overall academic performance.

The purpose of the Oklahoma Academic Scholar program is to recognize the outstanding academic achievement of graduating seniors in compliance with State law which became effective in 1986. Requirements include:

- Accumulate over Grades 9, 10, 11 and the first semester of grade 12, a minimum grade point average of 3.7 on a 4.0 scale or in the top 10% of their class.
- Complete (or will complete) the curricular requirements for a standard diploma.
- Achieve a 27 composite score on the ACT or 1220 combined score on the SAT 1. The ACT or SAT 1 must have been taken on a national test date.

Our seniors contributed to the significant growth in our State Academic Performance Index. During the years these students have attended Eufaula High School, our State Academic Performance Index has risen from 7th to 2nd place among neighboring schools, with only Ft. Gibson Schools scoring slightly higher.



The Eufaula Marching Maroon Band achieved their **Sixth Consecutive State Sweepstakes win**, the equivalent of a State Champion-

ship in Music. Matt Magreevy earned All-State on the trumpet. The Vocal Music department earned several

superior ratings at state contest. Michelle Williams & Erica Reynolds earned a Superior rating on their solo.

EHS Business Professionals of America sponsored by Allison Aday, participated in state-wide competition. Our students won the following honors: Top Ten in Administrative Support: Brandy Collard, Megan Oxford, & Chesilea Walker. Top Ten in Administrative Support Concepts, 2nd in Advanced Word Processing, and 4th in Financial Math & Analysis: Kelly Brunkhorst. Top Ten in Advanced Office Systens & Procedures: Lacy Sparks. Integrated Office Applications: 3rd place James Michael Combes. Fundamental Word Processing: 3rd place Deborah Hamilton. Basic Office Systems & Procedures: 1st place Elizabeth Hurley. Mrs. Aday's Desktop Publishing class also produced the programs for all school events.

Dedicated members of our community judge these recordings, and the winner's recording advances to the next level of competition in this national contest. This year, Jayson Hill, a junior, won first in the local contest and first in the region for a total of \$700.00 in cash awards. Michelle Whetstone, a junior, won second place in the local contest, and Dan Fisher, a senior, won third place.

In adition to these exceptional students, Chaney Robertson wrote a winning essay for the East Central Electric Cooperative Youth Tour Contest. His 500 word essay was over this year's topic, "Year 2104: Exploring an Electric Universe and How Your Electric Cooperative Made it Posible." Chaney was awarded an expense paid trip to Washington, D.C. for six days. This trip is worth several thousand dollars, but the real value will be the unforgettable memories he will possess when he returns from our nation's capitol.

The winners of the 2004 Eastern Oklahoma Writing Contest were announced by the Muskogee Phoenix. First Place in the Youth Division for Poetry is Miranda Masters, entry entitled, "Battle of Honey Springs." Sydniann Fourshey won second place and \$50.00 for her poem entitled, "My Home." Shalah Deere and Jennifer Hurley were recognized with honorable mention in the poetry division. These students will have their works included in the anthology published by the Muskogee Public Library. These students entered the contest as a writing assignments in Mrs. Applegate's Creative Writing Class. Over eighty submissions were sent to the contest in the adult and youth divisions.

Ironhead Football Sets Standard for EHS Athletics

Our 2003-2004 Ironhead Football Team Goes Undefeated with a 10-0 record in the regular season, breaking a record set in 1967. Another Record Breaking Ironhead Accomplishment was winning the District Championship, breaking a 1984 record. Cody Cox was selected to the Large School All State Football Team. Cody was also the Junior Golding Award winner. T. J. Benson was named the District Defensive Player of the Year as well as the McAlester Democrat's Defensive Player of the Year. Josh Tootill was named Defensive Lineman of the Year. Tray Bowie was named Offensive Player of the Year by the Muskogee Phoenix and Player of the Year by the McAlester Democrat. Travis Burkholter was named Newcomer of the Year by the Muskogee Phoenix and Newcomer of the Year by the McAlester Democrat. Head Coach Kerry Roberts and his assistant coaches continue to develop our students into exceptional athletes. Coach Roberts' ability to instill high expectations and high standards of conduct in his student athletes on and off the field has not gone unnoticed. Coach Roberts was honored this year with the following awards: District Coach of the Year - Muskogee Phoenix Coach of the Year - McAlester Democrat Coach of the Year and the OCA Region 3 Coach of the Year. National History Day is a year-long Education Program that engages students in grades 6-12 in the process of discovery and interpretation of historical topics. Students produce dramatic performances, imaginative exhibits, multimedia documentaries and research papers based on research papers related to an

annual theme. The annual theme is provided by the National History Day Foundation. Student projects are then evaluated at local, state, and national competitions. The Program serves as a vehicle to teach students important literacy skills and to engage them in the use and understanding of library and museum resources. The program inspires students to study local history, and then challenges them to expand their thinking by applying this knowledge of local events to the national scene.

Parents: The support of parents is one of the most important factors in the success of students participating in the History Day program. Parents who encourage and facilitate students in their History Day project often benefit as much from the process as do their children. The true benefits from participating in National History Day go beyond a certificate or medal. The program teaches kids the writing, analytical understanding, and reading comprehension skills that will make them a success in life, no matter what their career.

Through the Combined Effort of our Middle School Principal, Chris Whelan, Sixth Grade Teacher Debi Jones, and Media Specialist, Joy Salcedo, the National History Day Program will be presented to the sixth grade students and faculty this fall.

"We are anxious to provide 6th grade parents with detailed information about the 2004-2005 National History Day theme and the step by step process their children will be taking this fall as our sixth grade students begin their History Day journey. Classroom instruction followed by media center activities will provide students with important materials and information as well as time to decide on a history day topic that relates to the National History Day theme. The students must then narrow that topic down to one basic, manageable idea. Many times, selecting a topic and narrowing it to one idea is a difficult skill for students to understand. Even with ample teacher instruction covering each step of the research process and with time scheduled for students to study the national theme topic in the media center, parental involvement is crucial in making sure each child moves through the steps to meet deadline dates that are set for each step in this research program."

Teachers: The Sixth Grade Middle School Teachers will be the backbone of the History Day program. They will serve as mentors for students and are encouraged to integrate the History Day program into their classroom curriculum.

NHD Coordinators: Middle School Media Specialist Joy Salcedo, and Sixth Grade Teacher Debi Jones, will work with the students to help them understand and gather the required *Primary* and *Secondary* sources required for their history day project. Documenting those sources properly will be another step in developing the required research paper each student must create, regardless of their chosen project.

A creation station in the media center for student access to a scanner, digital camera, computer, and a copier is the hope of media specialist, Joy Salcedo. Using the media center's online card catalog, online magazine databases, and accessing web sites provided and suggested by the National History Foundation will supply a wealth of information for our students to learn and enjoy history while discovering the art of research.

"Our school has the technology to develop an outstanding research skills based curriculum. This curriculum will give our students a foundation for analytical and criticial thinking skills essential in each student's educational and professional endeavor. Teachers from across the nations say that because their schools have incorporated this program, interest in history is increasing, students have improved their thinking skills, and they have become much more analytical. I am looking forward to bringing history to life through different means of expression that will include videography, technology, music, and drama while at the same time enhancing our students' research and communication skills. With parental involvement, this will be a great School to Home experience. I am looking forward for the opportunity to work jointly with the 04-05 sixth grade parents, teachers, & students in making sure our National History Day program is a success."
